NEWPORT NEWS RETURNS HOME TODAY AFTER NATO EXERCISES, NORTH ATLANTIC CALLS



Newport News returns home today after eight weeks of showing the flag in Northern Europe ports, and participation in two NATO exercises. Exercise Royal Knight, a major NATO exercise, ran from September 27 through October 4 in the Norwegian Sea, under the overall command of Vice Admiral Vincent P. de Poix, USN, Commander of NATO's Striking Fleet Atlantic, embarked in Newport News. Later the ship participated in Exercise Magic Sword IV, a fast reaction exercise in the North Sea.

In press conferences prior to the exercises, VADM de Poix warned of expanding Soviet presence in the seas surrounding northern Europe. He said the Soviet Navy, operating out of a huge base at Murmansk in the Kola Peninsula, has been increasingly active in the Norwegian Sea.

To counteract the Soviet builup, the Admiral said, "we're trying to coordinate the strength of our NATO partners. We are placing a great deal more dependence on them now than in the past."

In Norfolk, I shall expect my Flagship to continue to be an example--in military courtesy, in personal appearance, and material smartness.




STAFE AND CREW ADD NEW ADDITIONS TO FAMILY

The Admiral also explained why Royal Knight was being conducted in the North Atlantic. "We must coordinate and train our navies in location and environment where the Striking Fleet might be called upon to work together," he said.

As the Admiral reiterated these remarks during his Oslo press conference, Russian naval forces were gathering off the port of Oslo. They had their ships in open water; they were there to see and test the strong will of the NATO forces; and they were proving they could already operate in the location and environment of the North Atlantic.

The stage was set--and NATO Exercise Royal Knight began.

Its scope and magnitude encompassed some 38 ships and 200 land and carrier based aircraft from Canada, the United Kingdom, Norway, the Netherlands, Germany, and the U.S.

There were three Carrier Task Groups, headed by the U.S. carriers Independence and Intrepid and the British carrier Ark Royal. Aboard Independence was Rear Admiral W. D. Houser, U.S. Navy, Commander Carrier Division Two, and Commander Carrier Striking Force for the exercise. Aboard Intrepid was Rear Admiral G. P. Steel, U. S. Navy, Commander Anti-submarine Carrier Task Force, and on board Ark Royal was Rear Admiral J. D. Teacher, Commander Carrier Division Two. Throughout the eight-day ex-

ercise of simulated naval wartime operations. Aggressor forces--simulated by NATO ships, submarines and aircraft--made air and sea probes against NATO Striking Fleet units.

In the defense role, Independence and Ark Royal made strike (simulated) and reconnaisance flights on land targets and air defense networks, tracked enemy shipping, and engaged enemy planes attempting to attack the task groups.

Many of these missions were flown during low ceilings and rain--making the tasks more dificult. At the same time, however, the low ceilings and rain missions were a form of training as it accustomed pilots and flight deck personnel to operations in cold and adverse weather.

Locating, tracking and simulating destruction of submarines (anti-submarine warfare) was the detense job of the Intrepid and her task group which included six U. S. ships and two Dutch destroyers.

In carrying out the ASW flight operations—Intrepid employed the S2E tracker aircraft, the EIB tracer aircraft and the SH3 helo. Helos from Independence and Buccaneer aircraft from Ark Royal assisted in the ASW missions.

Also of significant note during the exercise, was the anti-submarine and anti-air support given the task group by NATO's standing Naval Force Atlantic, a permanent muti-national squadron made up of frigates and destroyers from the Netherlands, Germany, the United Kingdom, and the United States.

Observance by the Russian Navy of the exercise came in various forms. Russian M-type bombers, "Bear", and TU-16, "Badger", aircraft made repeated passes at low altitudes over the carrier task groups, always escorted by U.S. and British fighter planes.

During the fly-over of the Russian planes--and at various times throughout the exercise--Russian intelligence gathering ships, guided missle cruisers and destroyers took up station within the NATO formations, observing the combined sea and air operations.

100th Z-GRAM ESTABLISHES NEW PERSONNEL EXCHANGE PROGRAM

The 100th Z-Gram was issued by the Chief of Naval Operations, Admiral Elmo R. Zumwalt, Jr. It establishes a new "Personnel Exchange Program" (PEP) between the U.S. Navy and allied navies.

"Negotiations to establish exchange billets are currently underway with Australia, New Zealand, Canada, United Kingdom, Greece, the Netherlands, Italy, and the Federal Republic of Germany," according to Adm. Zumwalt. "We plan to expand the program to other allied navies."

"Exchange personnel are not intended to be liaison officers, advisors, instructors, or observers," he added, "but integrated working menbers of the unit or staff in which they are employed."


Officers assigned will normally be Commanders and below, and enlisted personnel will normally be career designated Petty Officers Second Class or above.

A forthcoming OPNAV instruction and BUPERS notice will formally establish the program and promulgate procedures for volunteering.
